Solutions based on American values

The Casey Foundation offers several recommendations based on shared values of opportunity, responsibility and security. The Casey Foundation urges leaders — from the national and state level to counties, cities and other local settings — to act now to help families lift themselves out of these circumstances. Policies at the community, county and state levels that can have a significant impact on the lives of children in struggling families include:

EDUCATION AND COMMUNITY:

- Increase opportunity by expanding access to high-quality pre-k and early childhood services so that all children are prepared to succeed in school.
- Build and support an early childhood care & education system as a public good open for all families regardless of income to support parents returning to work and school.
- Allow for flexibility in training and school programs for parents to use resources as fit their life circumstances.
- Implement a loan forgiveness program for early childhood professionals all over NYS with special attention to childcare deserts (definition here) for priority candidates.
- Provide a tax credit for early childhood providers to improve their physical space and materials in efforts to incentivize improving quality of space and care provided.

• ECONOMICS and COMMUNITY:

- Increase opportunity and transform struggling communities into safe and healthier places to live, work and grow.
- Support new and emergent business models that allow for flexibility of childcare and parenting duties if schools are closed or online for extended time period(s).
- Supporting development and property-ownership models that preserve affordable housing, such as community land trusts and limited-equity cooperatives.
- Ending housing discrimination based on whether a person was formerly incarcerated or is using a federal housing voucher.
- Assisting low-income residents in paying higher property taxes that often come
 with new development/redevelopment or with a family's relocation to a more
 affluent area.
- Expanding workforce training that is targeted to high-poverty, low-opportunity communities.

- Requiring and incentivizing anchor institutions to hire locally and contract with businesses owned by women and people of color.
- Developing and funding small-business loan programs that serve entrepreneurs in low-income neighborhoods and communities of color — or people that traditional lenders tend to reject, such as individuals with poor credit or criminal records.

LAW ENFORCEMENT & COMMUNITY

- Promote the addition of social workers and psychiatric nurses in our local public safety departments. Allowing families who call for help with a loved one with mental illness or a domestic violence situation receive appropriate response and support.
- o Promote police-free schools. The time has come for this sea change.
- Promote reimaging school safety from punishment with risk of bias to restorative and anti-racist policies and programs.
