





Understanding Executive Orders 14148 and 14236

- In January & February, <u>Trump revoked 91</u> of President Biden's executive orders.
- Sixty-seven of those <u>revocations came</u> in a single EO (<u>EO 14148</u>, "Initial Rescissions of Harmful Executive Orders and Actions"), representing the most extensive set of revocations ever issued in one EO.
- Trump revoked an <u>Obama-era order</u> protecting LGBTQ+ federal contractors, and the <u>underlying policy</u> for the order, first established by President Johnson in 1965.
- In March, President Trump introduced another sweeping EO titled "<u>Additional</u> <u>Rescissions of Harmful Executive Orders and Actions</u>" (EO 14236). This EO revokes previous EOs concerning including but not limited to the following: the COVID-19 response, the foreign policy workforce and diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI), global LGBTQ+ rights, worker wages and unions, tribal self-determination, and labor rights.

Constitutional Rights Under Attack: 270+ Lawsuits Filed

- First Amendment: free speech, press, religion, protest, & assembly
- Fourth Amendment: protection against unreasonable searches and seizures
- Fifth & Fourteenth Amendments: due process and equal protection any constitutional protections at all.
- Sixth Amendment: Right to a fair and speedy trial & Eighth Amendment: protection against cruel and unusual punishment
- Tenth Amendment: states' rights
- Fourteenth Amendment: birthright citizenship

Supreme Court Case on Citizenship & Nationwide Injunctions

- A <u>nationwide or universal injunction</u> is a court order that prevents a government entity from enforcing a law, regulation, or policy across the entire nation.
- In the context of birthright citizenship, several federal courts issued nationwide injunctions, effectively blocking President Trump's EO that sought to end birthright citizenship for children born to undocumented parents.
- These injunctions have been appealed to the <u>Supreme</u>
 <u>Court</u>, raising questions about the scope of judicial authority to issue such broad orders.

NYS Attorney General Letitia James

 OVER TWO DOZEN LAWSUITS FILED: Challenging federal policies threatening to eliminate federal aid and dismantle vital programs: health and human services, grants to universities and research institutions, attacks on DEIA practices in schools.

• WINS: Temporarily halted the dismantling of DOE and AmeriCorp programs.



Litigation to Protect Head Start & Other Critical Programs

- Attorney General James led a coalition of 19 other attorneys general to sue the Trump administration's dismantling of US Department of Health and Human Services.
- Violation of the Constitution (Separation of Powers and the Appropriations Clause), the Administrative Procedures Act, & federal laws.
- Motion for a Preliminary Injunction: NY v Kennedy (filed on May 5th in U.S. District Court for the District of Rhode Island). Decision pending.
- Lawsuit by parent advocacy groups and Head Start providers also challenging Trump's dismantling of Head Start (WA State Head Start Assn of Head Start et al. v. Kennedy (filed May 16, 2025). Decision pending.

Governors' Letter to the President

Governor Hochul and 15 other governors signed a letter to the President that strongly voiced their support of Head Start.



As of today, Head Start funding remains flat funded for next federal FY.








P-3 Literacy Best Practices

A required tool to be utilized annually by public school districts in New York when reviewing curriculum and instruction for evidence and scientifically- based reading instruction, prior to submitting the attestation per law §818.

OFFICE OF EARLY LEARNING TOP IO GREATEST HITS of the 24-25 SCHOOL YEAR

The following is a highlight of the resources produced by the Office of Early Learning in the 2024-2025 school year.

P-3 Literacy Resources

This year, the Office of Early Learning (OEL) created multiple literacy resources available at the link above. This included the P-3 Literacy Instructional Best Practices Guide, P-3 Literacy Attestation Memo, and recordings of the Literacy Webinar Event that took place on January 7th, 2025.

2 2024- 2025 Early Learning Webinar Series

The Office of Early Learning offered a P-3 webinar series that focused on resources and tools for classroom teachers, school administrators, and P-3 educators. Webinars covered various topics including science, behavior, inclusion, and multilingual learners.

3 P-3 Learning Continuum Webinars

A series of webinars were created to support understanding and use of the P-3 Instructional Toolkit. These webinars give an overview of the toolkit and highlight how several districts across New York State have used it to increase the use of effective, equitable P-3 instructional strategies.

5 <u>Kindergarten Transition</u> <u>Toolkit</u>

The transition toolkit is a resource to aid in planning, implementing, and evaluating Kindergarten transition activities. It aims to ensure all stakeholders are prepared, engaged, and working collaboratively to support children's successful entry into Kindergarten and promote positive educational outcomes. Science Everywhere

Science Everywhere is an early learning initiative that emphasizes inquiry-based learning for young children. Led by the Office of Early Learning and Office of Cultural Education, the program fosters children's love for science and nature through hands-on learning experiences.

P-3 Cultural Connections

Tuition rate setting methodology recommendations for preschool and school-age special education providers currently under review by DOB

1.2.9% Tuition Rate Growth


Proposed 2.9% growth for preschool Special Class, SCIS, SEIS, and schoolage programs.

2.4% Evaluation Rate Growth

Proposed to increase multidisciplinary evaluation rates by 4%

3. Higher Of Reform

Proposed to continue reform that will help mitigate impact of underspending on future rates



4. Interim Plus Plus

Proposed that interim rates continue to include compounded growth when issued

5. Enrollment Adjustment

Requested 5% enrollment adjustment factor


6.35% Non-Direct Care

Proposed the non-direct care screen remain at 35%

Chapter 56 of the Laws of 2023 **Tuition Rate Setting Methodology Redesign**





What was in the Enacted State Budget?

- Expanded Child Tax Credit
 - Eliminates the phase-in
 - \$1,000/child under age four
 - \$500/child up to age 17
- Child Care
 - \$400M to backfill the CCAP shortfall
 - \$350M (competitive grants) for NYC/ROS; \$50M (non-competitive) for ROS
 - Funds substitute pools, to be administered by CCRRs
 - \$100M for capital projects
 - \$1M for business/labor leader coalion
- Afterschool
 - Expands access to some LEAPS contracts
 - Nearly \$9M added; most goes to a COLA

Enacted Budget...continued


- Baby Benefit
 - \$1,800 to 5,000 TANF recipients at birth
- Newborn Baby Bags
- Home Visiting
 - Flat-funded
- Early Intervention
 - Zero investment
- Dolly Parton's Imagination Library
 - \$1M investment
- Help Me Grow
 - \$1M investment

What happened post-budget?

Child Care Bills

- Wait list bill passed; goes to Governor
- Automatic rate increase/cost model bill probably dead
- Ratio bill still in play
- Early Intervention Bill
 - Rate reform study bill still in play (perhaps)

What's happening at the federal level?

- EdTrust--New York, Schuyler Center, CDF, TCA, WCA...
- Host of issues to work on!
- Collecting stories/data
- Keeping in touch with congressional leaders
- Sharing info with all congressional offices
- Educating state leaders re: how fed cuts will impact NYS families
- Legislature may return in Sept to address fed cuts


